ПЕРЕДМОВА

Посібнику містить 12 варіантів завдань з англійської мови для підготовки до складання НМТ. Зміст блоку завдань відповідає програмі ЗНО з англійської мови. Для кращої адаптації формат виконання завдань максимально наближено до реального тестування.

Усі варіанти відповідають структурі НМТ:

- Reading (читання, розуміння прочитаного, доповнення текстів із пропусками);
- Use of English (доповнення текстів із пропусками, активізація мовних структур і лексичних одиниць).

Усього в НМТ з англійської мови 32 завдання, з-поміж яких:

- 5 завдань (№ 6—10) з вибором однієї правильної відповіді. Завдання складається з основи та чотирьох варіантів відповіді, з яких лише один правильний. Завдання вважається виконаним, якщо учасник / учасниця національного мультипредметного тесту вибрав і позначив / вибрала та позначила відповідь;
- 11 завдань (№ 1-5, № 11-16) на встановлення відповідності. У завданнях пропонується дібрати заголовки до текстів / частин текстів з наведених варіантів; твердження / ситуації до оголошень / текстів; запитання до відповідей або відповіді до запитань. Завдання вважається виконаним, якщо учасник / учасниця мультитесту встановив / установила відповідність і позначив / позначила варіант відповіді в таблиці відповідей.
- 16 завдань (№ 17–32) на заповнення пропусків у тексті. У завданнях пропонується доповнити абзаци / речення в тексті реченнями / частинами речень, словосполученнями / словами з наведених варіантів. Завдання вважається виконаним, якщо учасник / учасниця мультипредметного тесту вибрав і позначив / вибрала та позначила варіант відповіді в таблиці відповідей.

Завдання з англійської мови оцінюватимуть відповідно до такої схеми нарахування балів: по 1 балу за кожну правильну відповідь на завдання з вибором однієї правильної відповіді; по 1 балу за кожну правильно визначену логічну пару в завданнях на встановлення відповідності; по 1 балу за кожну правильну відповідь на заповнення пропусків у тексті.

Отже, за виконання завдань з англійської мови можна отримати від 0 до 32 балів. Пізніше результат буде переведено в шкалу 100–200 балів.

11 Marie Skłodowska, born in Warsaw in 1867, was 12 Frida Kahlo, a renowned 20th-century artist, led a the youngest of five children. Her parents were both teachers, and her father taught math and physics. Marie was passionate about these subjects but faced gender barriers. She even attended lectures at Krakow University dressed as a man until she was caught. Marie and her sister joined the Flying University, a secret school that admitted women.

Marie Curie moved to Paris in 1891, earning degrees in mathematics and physics while supporting herself as a tutor. She became the University of Paris's first female professor and married Pierre Curie in 1895. Marie's research on radioactivity led to discoveries of polonium and radium and the development of radiotherapy, a key cancer treatment. She was the first person to win two Nobel Prizes, in Physics (1903) and Chemistry (1911).

Unable to attend university due to gender restrictions, Germain adopted the identity of a male student who had left using his lecture notes and submitting work under his name. Her true identity was revealed when a professor, impressed by the sudden improvement in the student's work, requested a meeting. Fortunately, the professor was supportive and encouraged her. Germain, working from home with limited resources, became deeply interested in number theory. She boldly corresponded with Carl Gauss, a leading mathematician of the time, under her male pseudonym. After three years, Gauss was astonished to discover her true identity and praised her to his colleagues. Germain became the first woman to win a prize from France's Royal Academy.

Fanny composed 460 pieces, including the Piano Trio in D, Quartet in E-flat, Piano Sonata in G minor, and Das Jahr. She died of a stroke while conducting one of Felix's oratorios.

Her concept of looping commands groundwork for modern computing. contributions went largely unrecognized until the 1950s, leading to the naming of the programming language "Ada" in her honor in 1980.
 - aviator who set numerous records championed women in aviation. Born on July 24, 1897, in Atchison, Kansas, Earhart defied gender norms, excelling in basketball and auto repair, and later worked as a Red Cross nurse during World War I. Captivated by aviation, she took flying lessons in 1921 and purchased her first plane, nicknamed "the Canary." Earhart made history by flying solo across the Atlantic in 1932 and from Hawaii to the U.S. mainland in 1935. In 1929, she helped found the Ninety-Nines, an organization for female pilots.

In 1937, Earhart vanished over the Pacific Ocean on July 2. She was officially declared lost at sea on July 19, 1937.

Space Tourism: Fantasy or Reality

Space tourism might seem like something from a futuristic movie, but it has been a reality for nearly 20 years. The journey began with Dennis Tito, the first civilian to visit the International Space Station in 2001, at a staggering cost of \$20 million. While this price made space travel seem like a distant dream for most, recent developments are changing that perception.

The excitement surrounding space tourism is undeniable. For decades, the idea of traveling beyond Earth's atmosphere has fascinated people. Thanks to technological advancements, this dream is becoming accessible to more than just astronauts and scientists. Space tourism offers a unique opportunity to see our planet from a new perspective, experience weightlessness, and witness the stunning beauty of space.

The market for space tourism is growing rapidly. In 2022, the global space tourism market was valued at \$695.1 million and is projected to reach over \$8.6 billion by 2030, with an annual growth rate of 40.2 %. This growth is fueled by increasing interest from a broader audience, not just the wealthy.

Space tourism can be divided into two types: suborbital and orbital flights. Suborbital flights allow passengers to experience a brief period in space before returning to Earth. Companies like Virgin Galactic and Blue Origin are leading in this area, offering rocket-powered flights to the edge of space. Orbital flights, on the other hand, involve spending more time in space at higher altitudes, potentially lasting from a few days to over a week. This segment is expected to grow the fastest offering opportunities to travel to orbit.

Despite the excitement, space tourism faces challenges. The environmental impact of rocket launches includes significant emissions and potential damage to the ozone layer. Additionally, space travel remains expensive, with costs starting around \$1 million per trip. Safety is also a concern, as space tourism is still a relatively new field with inherent risks.

As the industry develops, it must address these challenges to ensure a sustainable and safe future. Innovations in technology and regulations will be crucial in making space tourism more accessible while minimizing its environmental footprint.

His equation, $E = mc^2$, became famous for its role in understanding nuclear reactions. Einstein later focused on unified field theory, trying to merge gravity with electromagnetism. He died on April 18, 1955, at age 76, leaving a legacy as one of the 20th century's most influential scientists.



How Nature Inspires Technology: The Field of Biomimicry

Biomimicry, a term combining "bios," meaning life, and "mimesis," meaning imitation, is a fascinating scientific discipline that draws inspiration from nature to solve human problems. This field involves studying nature's best ideas and mimicking these designs and processes to create innovative solutions. By observing how animals, plants, and other organisms have evolved to overcome challenges, scientists and engineers can develop technologies that are efficient, sustainable, and effective.

The core idea of biomimicry is that nature, with 3.8 billion years of evolution, has already solved many of the issues we face today. For example, natural selection has led to the survival of only the most efficient designs in nature, providing a rich source of ideas for human innovation. Another example is the Shinkansen bullet train in Japan. The Secrets of Longevity in the Bolivian Jungle

Deep in the heart of the Bolivian Amazon, 84-yearold Martina Canchi Nate moves with remarkable energy. In a few short minutes, she digs up yucca roots and skillfully cuts down a plantain tree, effortlessly slinging the heavy bunch over her back. "I've done this my whole life," she says, beaming with pride.

Martina belongs to the Tsimane, a semi-nomadic indigenous community of around 16,000 people who live a subsistence lifestyle. Their daily routines are a blend of hunting, farming, and weaving—activities that keep them constantly active. Scientific studies have revealed that the Tsimane possess some of the healthiest arteries ever recorded and experience slower brain aging compared to people in industrialized nations.

"Imagine, a 75-year-old Tsimane's arteries are comparable to those of a 50-year-old American," explains Professor Hillard Kaplan, who has dedicated two decades to studying the Tsimane's unique health. Their diet, rich in fiber and low in fat, consists primarily of carbohydrates, with 72 %

of their calories coming from sources like fruits, vegetables, and grains. Notably, they consume no processed foods or sugars, which contributes to their remarkable cardiovascular health.

Even in their later years, Tsimane elders like Juan, who is around 78, remain active. He still participates in hunting but admits, "I don't walk as far anymore... maybe two days at most."

However, life in the jungle is not without its challenges. Modern changes, including forest fires and the **encroachment** of modern conveniences, are slowly impacting their traditional way of life. "The fire made the animals leave," Juan laments, highlighting the environmental pressures facing their community.

Despite these changes, the Tsimane embrace aging with a sense of acceptance and peace. As Hilda, 81, chuckles, "I'm not afraid of dying... they'll bury me, and I'll stay there — very still." Their unique lifestyle and perspective on aging offer intriguing insights into longevity and well-being in our rapidly changing world.

Despite Dougal's background in the British merchant navy, he hadn't prepared much for the trip. The family enjoyed their time sailing until June 15, 1972, when killer whales attacked their boat near the Galapagos Islands, damaging it badly and causing it to sink. Harland Sanders

Colonel Harland Sanders is a name that many people may not know, but almost everyone recognizes KFC, the famous fast-food chain he started. Born in 1890 in Henryville, Indiana, Sanders faced many challenges in his life. When he was just six years old, his father passed away, leaving him to take care for his younger siblings. This early responsibility made him strong and determined.

Sanders dropped out of school in the seventh grade to work as a farmhand. At 16, he lied about his age to join the U.S. Army, but after a year, he was honorably discharged. What Is ADHD?

ADHD, or Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder, is a condition that affects the brain's development and functioning. It is commonly diagnosed in childhood but can continue into adulthood. Around 2 % to 7 % of adults worldwide have ADHD.

ADHD impacts the brain's executive functions, which are essential for tasks such as planning, focusing, and organizing. Billy Roberts, an ADHD therapist, explains that these functions help people plan ahead, stay focused, and manage distractions. While the exact cause of ADHD is not known, certain factors may contribute to its development. These include a family history of ADHD, premature birth, and low birth weight.

There is no cure for ADHD, but several treatments can help manage its symptoms and improve quality of life. ADHD symptoms can vary between children and adults. For instance, adults with ADHD often struggle to pay attention and may find it challenging to stay focused on tasks that require extended mental effort. This can result in problems like zoning out during conversations or meetings.

Procrastination and difficulty completing tasks are also common. Adults with ADHD might put off tasks and have trouble finishing projects, which can lead to issues with paying bills, completing work tasks, or managing long-term projects.

Forgetfulness is another concern. Adults with ADHD often experience short-term memory problems and may forget important details or feel criticized for their forgetfulness.

Feelings of underachievement can also occur. Adults may feel they are not reaching their potential due to their difficulties managing tasks, which can lead to feelings of being lazy or inadequate.

Social difficulties are reported as well. Adults with ADHD may feel misunderstood or struggle with social interactions. They might interrupt others or react strongly in social situations.

Restlessness is another symptom. While children with ADHD often display visible hyperactivity, adults might feel restless and have trouble relaxing.

If you think you might have ADHD, talk to your doctor. They can refer you to a specialist for a complete evaluation, which includes reviewing recent symptoms, your history, and ruling out other conditions. Seeking professional help is crucial for an accurate diagnosis and effective treatment. Understanding and managing ADHD can greatly improve your quality of life and coping strategies.

New York City

New York City is famous for its stunning skyline and diverse culture. The city's skyscrapers, such as the Empire State Building, are so immense that they have their own zip codes.
